For over 30 years the Bat Conservation Trust (BCT) has been the leading non-governmental organisation in the UK solely devoted to the conservation of bats and the landscapes on which they rely.

National Bat Monitoring Programme

- UK wide community science project set up 25 years ago, now monitoring 11 of the 17 bat species that breed in Britain.
- Over 1000 volunteer community scientists monitoring over 1000 sites using a variety of surveys.
- Using cutting edge technology to broaden the diversity of people engaged as well as the species & habitats monitored.
- Using affordable passive acoustic detectors along with classifiers is revolutionising NBMP.

Research

- Committed to conservation policy, practice & guidance based on a scientific evidence base.
- Using & generating scientific evidence to underpin bat conservation.
- Collaborating with experts from academic & governmental research organisations.
- Celebrating the work of others through the Vincent Weir & Kate Barlow Awards.
